Gopalakrishnan to perform at this esteemed Sabha." His musical journey intertwined with performances alongside eminent artists like S. Kalyanaraman, flutist N. Ramani, T.N. Seshagopalan, and the renowned Maharajapuram Santhanam, drawing full-house audiences. Particularly treasured is his experience performing alongside the veteran T.V. Sankaranarayanan when he was awarded 'Sangeetha Karasarathy' during the centenary year of Sri Parthasarathy Swamy Sabha.

"Parthasarathy Sabha has been a constant support throughout my musical odyssey. Year after year, I have been on its stage, performing for seniors muscians' concerts and participating in lecture demonstrations focused on unique themes and imparting knowledge to music students," Muralidharan expresses. He finds joy in collaborating with the next generation of musicians, delighting in performing alongside talents like Neyveli Santhanagoplan and the Carnatica brothers. Muralidharan encourages young musicians to absorb the essence of past maestros, emphasising the value of learning from stalwart musicians and nagaswaram artistes. "We are eager to share our knowledge and guide passionate students and performers striving to elevate their musical prowess," he affirms.

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Dwaram Venkataswami Naidu Award: Dr. M.L.V. Award Vittal Ramamurthy

Vittal Ramamurthy, an internationally acclaimed violinist and a distinguished artist of the All India Radio, embodies the essence of the revered Lalgudi bani as its torchbearer and principal disciple. Renowned for his unwavering dedication and exceptional talent, his repertoire spans across various roles - from a solo virtuoso to an exemplary accompanist, an educator, and, above all, a humble learner in the realm of artistry. His musical journey is marked by numerous solo violin performances and collaborations with legends of the past and present across the globe.

Traversing the world, Vittal Ramamurthy not only showcases India's rich musical heritage but also participates in International Jazz festivals and

Duet concerts alongside globally acclaimed artists. His knowledge-sharing endeavors include Lecture Demonstrations and workshops conducted at esteemed institutions such as Rice University, Harvard University, and Concordia University.

Dedicated to propagating Carnatic music, Vittal Ramamurthy mentors students worldwide, nurturing many who have evolved into leading performers. He also orchestrates free summer music camps annually in his hometown, Karunbithil near Dharmasthala, India, fostering around 300 children in a Gurukulam-style training. His musical prowess earned him an invitation to perform at the Rashtrapati Bhavan for U.S. President Barack Obama and other dignitaries in New Delhi in 2010.

His artistry continues to captivate audiences worldwide, enriching the musical landscape with his emotive and resonant performances.

An 'A' graded violinist by All India Radio, Vittal boasts an impressive array of accolades, including the Shanmukhananda Sangeetha Shironmani Award, Lavanya Shruti Nipuna from the Puvanur Legacy Trust, and consecutive Best Concert Awards from the revered Music Academy. The list extends to include the prestigious Best Violinist Award at the Kalavanta National Youth Festival in 2014, among others, marking his exceptional contributions to music.

Beyond being a highly sought-after accompanist, Vittal has cultivated a distinct identity as a solo performer. His skillful support to his mentor Kum. Kanyakumari and collaborations with eminent musicians globally have solidified his reputation.

In addition to his musical prowess, Vittal is a Chartered Accountant. His remarkable achievement of clearing the entire course in his very first attempt speaks volumes about his commitment and diligence in both fields.

Palghat Mani Iyer Centenary Award : Dr. Yella Venkateshwara Rao

S ri Parthasarathi Swami Sabha will be presenting the Palghat Mani Iyer Centenary award to Mridangam Maestro Dr. Yella Venkateshwara Rao, who is a man of considerable achievements!

A resident of Attapur, Hyderabad, and born in a patriotic family, Pandit Dr. Yella Venkateshwara Rao garu, started giving public concerts at the tender age of seven. His father Sri Ramamurthy was a disciple of Dwaram and his youngest grandfather Yella Veerasamy was a mridanga vidwan. Yella's guru was Sri Yella Somanna. Somanna's guru in turn was the inimitable Mridangam Maestro, Padma Bhushan Palghat T.S. Mani Iyer.

Yella garu, had an illustrious career and retired as Professor, Coordinator and Performing Artist at Rajiv Gandhi University Knowledge. He has served in AIR (All India Radio), from 1962 to 1991. He was a Mridangam Artist belonging to the "A" Top Grade, since 1979.

He is a world record-holder, who entered the Guinness Book of Records for his achievement of giving a non-stop performance for thirty six (36) hours, playing on "Mridanga Maha Yagnam", without a morsel of food or a gulp of water. He was conferred "PADMASRI" by Government of India in the year 2008.

Name the artiste and you'll find Yella garu has accompanied them. The list is truly phenomenal in its breadth and includes Bharath Ratnas, M.S. Subulakshmi, Pandit Ravishankar. And the others were Madurai Somasundaram, M.L. VasanthaKumari, D.K. Jayaram, Brindha & Muktha, Semangudi Srinivasa Iyer, Dr. Balamuralikrishna, Dr. L. Subrahmanyam, K.J. Yesudas, and the list goes on ad infinitum.

His creativity knew no bounds and he dazzled with producing and choreographing a number of musical ballets and dramas in classical carnatic, folk and light styles, presenting novel themes and programmers at Doordarshan, Hyderabad. He introduced solo Mridangam



concerts viz. Mimicry in Mridangam and Laya Mridangamdhyanam, created and composed different talas and many laya patterns.

Dr. Yella charitable trust started 25 years back has been in the forefront in conducting many social activities to help the poor and the needy and deserving folk.

Dr. R.S. Jayalakshmi is bestowed with the Partha Acharya Puraskar this year. As a renowed musicologist, teacher and Vainika, Dr RS Jayalakshmi regularly presents lec-dems at Parthasarathy Swami Sabha. And every year, Parthasarathy Sabha too takes pride to schedule a lec-dem of Dr. RSJ.

As she recollects, Parthasarathy Sabha has a uniqueness in identifying topics and themes for lec-dems. The topics chosen are such that, the sessions would be beneficial to the students of music and the lay rasikas. Tanam, handling of allied ragams, gamakas and musical forms are some of the topics she has recently handled. She adds that these lec-dems would also involve the attendees and become practice sessions for students. For example, in a lecdem

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on 'dwi tAla' practice, the attendees could learn to put different talams in both hands.

As a teacher, Dr. RSJ feels that students who come to lec-dems should come with background preparation. Since the topic is known, students could look up some basics to assimilate what is said. It would also help in asking good questions during the open session. "Preparing for a lec-dem also needs to be

rigourous. The audience could ask rather tricky questions at imes and an acharya should be prepared to answer them," she says. Questions such as 'when to introduce gamakas to students', and 'how



to handle musical forms' are commonly asked, she says. When talking about ragams, differences in handling them by different composers, especially the Trinity, is a very common theme.

Dr. RSJ is very happy to be receiving this Acharya Puraskar and says, "At any age, recognition is always special and it makes a person very happy and

proud when they are recognised and awarded for their work."

Gottuvadyam Narayana Iyengar Award: Dr. Suresh Vaidyanathan

This year, the 'Gottuvadyam' Narayana Iyengar Award for Musical Excellence is set to honour Dr. Suresh Vauidyanathan, affectionately known as 'Ghatam' Suresh.

Growing up in Triplicane, Suresh cherishes memories of the vibrant classical music concerts held at Sri Parthasarathy Swami Sabha and The Hindu High School in the mid-1970s. His musical journey flourished with his first significant stage performance during K.J. Yesudas's concert, where his guru, the Padma Bhushan awardee T.V. Gopalakrishnan, accompanied legends like violin maestro

T.N. Krishnan on stage. "I owe it to my guru for granting me the opportunity to perform alongside these maestros," he gratefully recalls.

"Following the Sabha's relocation from Triplicane to Vidya Bharathi in Mylapore, I have remained a regular performer here. The Sabha's secretaries ensured harmony among performers and valued my input. Their warm interaction with artists deserves special recognition," he applauds, reflecting on the Sabha's December music festival.

Receiving the award named after 'Gottuvadyam' Narayana Iyengar, a revered maestro, fills Suresh with pride. "Ghatam is a 'visesha vadyam' and it holds unique significance as it is crafted solely from the Pancha bhutas (five elements of nature). It stands as the only instrument made entirely of clay, is environmentally friendly, and can



be hailed as an organic instrument. Its namam (name), rupam(form), and Utpadanam (creation) have remained largely unchanged since the instrument came into existence," he passionately explains. "Also, this instrument is referred to philosophically in concepts beyond religion," he adds.

"The authentic styles in Ghatam playing belong to Pazhani Krishna lyer and Umayalpuram Narayana lyer. I was fortunate to be a disciple of the latter for six years in a 'gurukula vasam' setting. This award holds profound significance for me and my instrument," Suresh concludes with heartfelt gratitude.
